


We, at Bourke High, believe that all students can succeed.

Principal's Report

.Compulsory School Attendance

Education for children is extremely important and regular attendance at school is essential for them to achieve their learning best and increase their career and life options. Students below the age of 17 years are required to attend school each day it is open for students. Consequently parents and carers are responsible to ensure that their children arrive at school on time every day. Bourke High School classes begin at 8.45am of a morning, with breakfast available from the school canteen at 8.15am without cost. The school's breakfast program is a successful way to have students ready and on time for school. Having students arriving at school and class on time ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled in the morning, helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine, enables them to greet their friends before class and reduces class-room disruption. Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents and carers.

On occasions where a child needs to be away from school justified reasons for student absences may include: being sick or having an infectious disease, having an unavoidable medical appointment, or exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g. attending a funeral. Following an absence from school parents/carers are to ensure that within seven days the school is provided with an explanation for the absence. The school may decline to accept an explanation that has been provided if the principal believes that it is not in the best interest of the child. In these circumstances the child's absence is recorded as unjustified.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. It is important to understand the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Please consider that if a student misses 8 days in a school term, by the end of Year 10 they will have missed more than 6 months of school.

Year 7 Science


