
What's New at Our Library?


"Wombat" by Philip Bunting

The deliberately sparse script and silly illustrations invite the reader to follow the fate of a blossoming marsupial love story.






"Yule Not Open This Book" by Andy Lee and Heath McKenzie




"When We Became Humans" by Michael Bright

"Mega Monster" by David Walliams




"Diary of a Wimpy Kid: Big Shot" by Jeff Kinney
