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PRINCIPAL MATTERS

This week we celebrate the journey students take throughout the educational system and how we are creating futures for our students, with the opportunities we provide.

Education starts at home, from the engagement that you have with your child on a daily basis, from those early steps to learning to drive a car; creating futures together. From Kindergarten right through to post school pathways, our educational teaching staff are on a journey with your child, helping to prepare these young people to be agile thinkers and lifelong learners.

We can trace the history of education back to the first written records recovered from ancient civilization across the globe; schools creating future pathways for work in tomorrow's society. To appreciate where, we are today at Kandos High School, let us reflect on what has come before.

Our Nation's history stretches back tens of thousands of years, with our First Nations people sharing their knowledge of religious beliefs, society, daily life and laws from one generation to the next. Children were educated through self-directed play and exploration of the world. They were guided by adults to develop their knowledge of the plants and animals they depended on for food and the landscapes they foraged, whilst developing skills in designing and using tools for hunting and gathering; creating futures.

When Europeans arrived, some of the wealthier settlers wanted their children to be part of an educational

Ex-convicts and later members of the Church provided this service and so began the tradition of non-Indigenous education in Australia; their aim to prepare them for secondary education and for university studies; creating futures.

Poorer settlers children, that lived in country regions found themselves working in the fields, or at home helping to care for siblings. As industry grew, children living in towns and cities found themselves working in crowded factories or mines, seven days a week, in terrible conditions.

So what was a day in school like, lets go back to the 1850s:

- People thought it was more important for boys to receive an education; girls could learn to be good wives and mothers by staying at home.
- The first classes were held in tents made of canvas. Some women held lessons for their own and other children in their homes that may have been tents or timber cottages before school buildings were created.
- Girls sat on one side of the classroom with the boys sitting on the other side.
- Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, History, Geography and Grammar were the main subjects taught.
- Boys were taught Drawing and girls did Sewing.
- · Most of the teachers were men.
- Much of the work was learned by rote "repetition was the only way to learn!"
- Children spent most of the school day sitting on very hard wooden seats or benches.
- Sometimes there were up to 100 children in one classroom.
- Boys and girls walked in separate lines behind their teacher.
- Girls entered and left the room before the boys.
- A polite boy always removed his cap when meeting or talking to a lady.
- Girls dressed from head to toe and it was forbidden to show a bare ankle.
- Children were not permitted to write using their left hand.







- Discipline was harsh, many of the boys were given the strap or cane for being naughty; for example, if they did not listen to the teacher or were lazy they were given the "cuts". Often the teacher used sarcasm to punish the girls.
- They had to use a lot of imagination to keep themselves active outside in the schoolyard and would play games such as "Leap Frog", "Shuttlecock" and "Drop the Handkerchief". Girls played "Jacks" and boys played "Marbles".

So much has changed in the past hundred years, minimum ages for employment in selected occupations, child welfare legislation, and occupational safety and health standards; have been a part of the evolution of the compulsory public-school educational system that we know today; creating futures for our students.

Yesterday was National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children's Day; this year's theme "My Dreaming, My Future" celebrates kids being born into stories of their family, culture and Country. They carry with them the songlines of their ancestors and culture, passed down by generations. We sit here proudly with our Aboriginal colleagues and students, growing and learning our shared cultures and histories together. Not forgetting the past, we have seen intergenerational disadvantage for Aboriginal children - which as educators has proved difficult to overcome, resulting in generations of people missing out on education in both western learning and their own cultural learning opportunities. Kandos High School are committed to enhancing these opportunities for all of our students; creating futures.

Every child deserves a champion adult who will never give up on them, who understand diversity, the power of rapport, connects them back with that natural curiosity for learning and is committed to nurturing their potential sometimes in challenging circumstances, until a student can see it for themselves and develops into a life-long learner.

This week we celebrated those people, the families as first teachers, the community that help to shape our students, the students themselves and our staff at our special Merit Assembly yesterday. We look forward to dreaming and continuing to create the future together.

NAIDOC WEEK



RECOGNITION OF PROFICIENT TEACHERS

Teaching is just like driving a car. At university, as a part of your degree you start doing prac teaching. They do not turn you loose on classes straight away, when you first start there is another teacher. Their job is to yank up the hand break just as things edge on out of control - just like driving on your Ls. 
STAGE 5 MATHEMATICS




NOVEL STUDY - THE ENORMOUS CROCODILE





Dear parents, guardians and carers

Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- · category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools.
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. 
