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National Reconciliation Week



As part of our school's National Reconciliation Morning Tea, Year 12 Aboriginal Studies students Julia Stevens and Lara Young addressed the staff, sharing their perspectives on reconciliation. Julia's heartfelt speech is below. "This week, we

reflect on what reconciliation means not just as a word, but as a commitment. The theme for this year's National Reconciliation Week, "Bridging Now to Next" invites us all to consider the past, recognise where we stand in the present, and take responsibility for shaping a better future together. This theme speaks directly to the truth of our experience. We are the oldest living culture in the world over 65,000 years of connection to Country, community, and culture. But in the short span of modern Australian history, that deep continuity has been disrupted by dispossession, violence, and policies that

sought to erase who we are. Despite this, our cultures have survived. Our communities have endured. And our voices are growing stronger every day. When we talk about bridging now to next, we're talking about confronting hard truths, the impacts of colonisation, the injustices still faced by our people, the legacy of the Stolen Generations, and the gaps in health, education, and justice that continue to divide us. But this theme also challenges the



wider Australian community to walk with us, to understand that reconciliation isn't something that belongs to history. It's something that must live in the present and guide our future. Now is where we stand, a place shaped by both truth and injustice. Our communities still carry the weight of colonisation, of stolen lands, broken families, and systems that continue to disadvantage us. But now is also where we find strength, in our voices, in our survival, and in the growing recognition of the importance of First Nations culture, leadership, and resilience. Next is the future we are building, not just for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, but for all Australians. A future where the truth is not hidden, where our stories are taught and understood, and where our rights are not debated, but respected. But there is no next without taking real action in the now. Bridging now to next means listening, not just hearing our stories, but truly understanding them. It means truth-telling, even when the truth is hard to face. It means making space for our voices, our knowledge, and our leadership to shape this



country's future. Reconciliation is not just a word. It is a commitment to justice, to equity, and to healing. It belongs to all of us. And it starts with honest reflection, respectful dialogue, and collective action".

Pathways to Purpose – An innovative mentoring program How It Began

Pathways to Purpose began as part of the Youth Road Map project in March this year. Students from Years 9, 10, and 11 were invited to participate in focus groups held at the Dunn Lewis Centre, with the goal of empowering young people to have a voice in shaping the future of their community. Among those who attended were



Annie-Maree Martin and Jaya Pimm. Inspired by the focus groups, they eagerly signed up for a two-day youth leadership conference the following week. Fuelled by their enthusiasm and encouragement from mentors at the event, the vision for Pathways to Purpose began to take shape. On the second day of the conference, they pitched their project idea to a panel of community leaders — and were awarded a grant to bring it to life.

Post-Conference Momentum

Since the conference, Annie and Jaya's passion has continued to grow. One of their mentors, Justine Cox from Leadership Change Room, was so impressed by their vision that she invited them to the book launch of Women Living Fearlessly — an anthology of personal stories from women who have faced fear with courage and determination. Justine is one of the featured authors. In addition, Dr. Nici Sweaney from AI Her Way, who will be the keynote speaker at this year's Career & Community Showcase, has expressed interest in mentoring Annie and Jaya. They've also been offered support from Mel Louth (Think Regional) and Carly McTavish (Country University Centre). Annie and Jaya will also work closely with the Ulladulla High School Careers team to strengthen existing partnerships and opportunities. Pathways to Purpose is a mentorship initiative designed to connect students with local professionals, community leaders, and real-world experts to help them discover and pursue their passions. By offering group occupational talks and one-on-one mentorship opportunities,

the program bridges the gap between education and future careers, providing students with guidance, Inspiration, and a clearer sense of purpose.



Push Up Challenge

Water in the World Excursion

Last week, Year 7 students went out to the water in world excursion to investigate how our water services are coordinated across the region. While visiting the Kings Point sewerage treatment centre may not sound glamourous it is interesting to see the end



point of our water network. In addition, the students learn about the interplay in the regions dam systems with the Shoalhaven River, how our water is treated to make it world class and they also scientifically tested the water quality from Millard's Creek. In contrast, the students have been reading a book about the Sudanese 'Lost Boys' who were displaced during the Sudanese civil war and learning about the role water played in their epic saga and the difference that the



introduction of local wells made to the impoverished local people. As a bonus we spent the day outside in the beautiful south autumn sun with our friends. A massive thank you to the teachers and Mr Pearson for running the water workshops all day.


