Bikes, e-bikes and e-scooters

E-bikes

There are two types of permitted e-bikes: Electrically power-assisted cycles and Power-assisted pedal cycles.

Electrically power-assisted cycles

An electrically power-assisted cycle has a maximum continuous rated power of up to 500 watts. This power output must be:

- Progressively reduced as the bicycle's speed increases beyond 6km/h
- Cut off when:
 - Your bicycle reaches a speed of 25km/h
 - You stop pedalling and the speed exceeds 6km/h

Power-assisted pedal cycles

A power-assisted pedal cycle has one or more motors attached with a combined maximum power output of up to 200 watts. This bicycle:

- Cannot be propelled only by the motor/s
- Must weigh less than 50kg (including batteries)
- Have a height-adjustable seat

All petrol-powered bicycles are illegal on NSW roads and road-related areas such as footpaths, shared paths, cycle ways and cycle paths.



E-scooters

- Privately owned e-scooters can only be used on private property in NSW. They cannot be used on roads or road-related areas, including footpaths, shared paths, cycle ways and cycle paths.
- Hired shared scheme E-scooters are only able to be used on roads and road-related areas in designated e-scooter trial areas

E-skateboards

- E-skateboards are illegal in NSW, unless being used as a mobility aid for people with a disability who meet specific use conditions
- E-skateboards that do not meet these conditions can only be used on private property

School Bus Travel

Students travelling on a School Bus to and from school are required to have a valid school bus pass for the school service they are catching. If a valid school pass cannot be shown a fare will be charged. In the event the school bus pass is lost, some form of student ID is to be shown whilst obtaining a replacement pass (fee applies).



You can help make your child's school bus journey more pleasant by ensuring your child has a valid school bus pass and presents it to the driver in the morning AND afternoon. Parents are reminded that the School Free Travel is only valid between home and school as per the conditions on the back of the pass. Fares will be charged for all other journeys. Skateboards/Scooters/Bicycles are not permitted on the bus.
