It was wonderful to welcome our local community members to the school as we came together and reflected on the Reconciliation process and to acknowledge the Stolen Generation Survivors. Julie Steet-Smith and other AECG members were also present at the school on the day as were our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and their families. It was also great to welcome teachers, parents and students from our Primary Partner schools.

The South Coast Dance Festival is now once again back on our calendar. I will have the opportunity to attend this event later in the week and I am always so proud of the WHSPA students representing our school at this incredible showcase of local dance talent. I must acknowledge the efforts of the WHSPA Dance teachers – Mr Richards, Ms Ireland and Ms Zappia as well as our Dance tutors for their incredible work with our students.

One of the school focus areas is embedding Literacy and Numeracy initiatives across the school in all KLAs. Recently, the staff at WHSPA held a professional development session lead by Mr Phasavath, Ms Griffiths, Dr Mackriel and Mrs Petersen. Professional Learning also forms the basis of WHSPAs Executive Meetings which in turn forms the basis of Faculty meetings. This initiative aims to provide improved student learning outcomes with the consolidated approach across the entire school.

Recently, Years 7 and 9 took part in the NAPLAN tests. This year, all NAPLAN tests were held online. Over the last two years, WHSPA has invested in providing improved Wi-Fi connectivity across the school and in particular in the school hall. Students benefited greatly in being able to sit these exams with a minimum level of connectivity issues. Staff supervising these exams were in high praise of the students in the way they approached these exams. Mention must be made of Ms Griffiths who was tireless in her efforts with arranging these exams.

Year 11 will present their production of Ruby Moon later this term. The Australian play by Matt Cameron was once one of the HSC Drama texts to be studied, but now forms part of the Preliminary Drama HSC course. It will be wonderful to experience live theatre again in the WHSPAC. I look forward to watching our Year 11 students as they present their directorial concept of this wonderfully intriguing play.

Attendance

Attendance - Every day Counts

If your child has to be absent from school, you must tell the school and provide a reason for your child's absence.

Justified reasons for absences may include the student:

- Having an unavoidable medical or dental appointment (preferably, these should be made after school or during holidays)
- Being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- Being required to attend an exceptional or urgent family circumstance (such as attending a funeral)
- Being sick, or having an infectious disease.

Absences for reasons such as some of the following may not be justified:

- Shopping
- Sleeping in
- Working around the house
- Minding younger siblings and other children
- Minor family events such as birthdays
- Hair cuts

Holidays

Family holidays and travel related absences now require an application to be submitted to the Principal **PRIOR** to the leave taking place. Families are encouraged to take holidays with their child during school holidays and the Principal will decline the leave if they believe it is not in the best interest of the student. Please see the front office if you require an application form.

Sport

Sport and other physical activities help the healthy physical and mental development of children. Sports and sports carnivals are normal school activities and students must attend.

2022 Mock Trial Competition

For the past 30 years the Law Society of New South Wales has been conducting an Inter-School Mock Trial Competition. Together with over 300 other New South Wales secondary schools, Wollongong High is once again participating in this event.

Mock trials are simulated court cases in which the participating student teams contest a fictional legal dispute, with some based on actual cases. The case materials for the trials are provided by the Law Society and the trial is presided over by a senior member of the legal profession acting as a Magistrate. Teams are given the opportunity of preparing a case for the prosecution or defence in a criminal case, and plaintiff or defence in a civil case. Roles that the students take consist of barrister, solicitor, witness, court officer and magistrate's assistant.

By taking part in the competition students not only get an introduction to the law and legal processes, but learn vital skills in research, analysis and lateral thinking. Students also develop strong communication skills, confidence in addressing an audience, taking responsibility within a team and are given the opportunity to meet with their peers from different backgrounds and regions.

Three rounds of the competition have been held so far which were against St Mary's Star of the Sea College, Frensham College Mittagong and St John Bosco College Engadine. The 2022 Wollongong High School Mock Trial Team consists of representatives from Year 11 and students have had the opportunity of taking on various roles over the past three rounds. This week Dr Prue Salter from Enhanced Learning Educational Services (www.enhanced-learning.net) ran a study skills session with Year 10.






