### Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) & Restorative Practice

Each week we focus on a different aspect of PBL and we would like to share our focus areas over the remainder of the year.

#### Week 7

**PBL focus:** Report incidents to a teacher and stay in-bounds

PBL award for the week: Working cooperatively with others

When working cooperatively with others means it requires students to be respectful and responsibly with other students, teachers or community members. This could be group work or when playing a game. Working cooperatively means listen to others and treat everyone fairly to work.

#### PBL focus: Wear my uniform correctly

**PBL award for the week:** Demonstrating fairness and cooperation in the playground Demonstrating fairness and cooperation in the playground means playing games fairly, sharing, taking turns and using positive language and encouraging others. This should be when playing any game in any school setting.

#### **Restorative Practice**

At Rouse Hill Public School a restorative practice, a pro-social approach to resolving conflict, underpins our behaviour management. It is a whole school teaching and learning approach that encourages behaviour that is supportive and respectful. It puts the onus on individuals to be truly accountable for their behaviour and to repair any harm caused to others as a result of their actions. 

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Dear parents, guardians and carers

#### Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. ## Restorative practices at each level along the care continuum

Morrison, Thorsone and Blood (2005) cited in Oassarella (2017) use a hierarchical, whole-school approach with steps moving from proactive to reactive. These have been aligned to the <u>care</u> <u>continuum</u> of interventions aimed at supporting student behaviour from prevention to individual support. Restorative practices can align to each level of the care continuum. This is highlighted by how the Oakland Unified School District in the US implements their restorative approach.

## Prevention

School-wide prevention practices include:

- reaffirming relationships through developing social and emotional skills
- identifying common values and guidelines
- promoting and strengthening students' sense of belonging and ownership
- developing social-emotional understanding and skills to build healthy relationships
- using class circles to practice their social emotional skills.

## Early intervention and targeted support

Managing targeted difficulties and repairing relationships through:

- preventing harm
- resolving differences with restorative intervention
- building social-emotional capacity
- using harm circles, mediation and family group conferencing to address the causes of harm, focus on who is accountable and repair any harm.

## Individual interventions and supports

Intense interventions and rebuilding relationships through:

- focusing on accountability
- organising resources to address behavioural and academic support needs
- one to one support and successful reintegration for youth in crisis or those returning from suspension or incarceration.
