

## Stage 3 Camp

Last week, Stage 3 travelled to Canberra for a Civics and Citizenship overnight excursion. They had a wonderful time visiting a number of venues and participated in a range of educational programs, with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy. Some of the students have described the experience at each venue in their own words below.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australians being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion, the Australian Government contributed funding to our school in the amount of \$45.00 per student under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate program. The rebate will be paid directly to the school and has already been factored into the total cost of the excursion.

#### War Memorial: Brody D

My favourite thing in the Canberra Excursion was the Australian War Memorial because it was very interesting and I learned a lot of stuff that happened. This place was built on November 11th 1941 to commemorate the fallen soldiers and all the equipment or vehicles the Australians captured from enemy countries. I learned many things and I'll tell you 3:- that 102 Australian soldiers in WW1 were killed and lost their name tags so then Australia brought back one of them and built his grave in the Australian war memorial where the dome shape is; that over 60,000 Australian soldiers were killed in WW1 and each one of their names was written down on a wall to commemorate them and the last thing was that there is a fire on water in the Australian War Memorial and, that fire never gets extinguished no matter what happens. It has been lit for 80 years and it will not go out for rain, hail, wind or anything it just is permanently on.

#### Museum of Australian Democracy: Makenzie

My favourite place in Canberra was the Museum of Australian Democracy because we got to do a quiz and we got to see and go into the room where they held meetings with the prime minister. We got to see two outfits that two of the old prime ministers wore. The first one we saw was green and gold. There were gold squiggly lines and flowers on it and there was a hat to go with it. The hat had white feathers going everywhere along the top of the hat. The second one we saw was a yellow dress. It had a purple flower on it.

#### The National Electoral Education Centre: Saja

The National Electoral Education Centre was so exciting! Firstly, she/ the worker sat us down and explained everything we needed to know about the National Electoral Education Centre. We then got to sit in a small movie theatre which showed us how voting was established, and what people in Australia had to go through to make voting fair.1901 was when democracy first made its way into Australia. Men were only allowed to vote, but these men had to be wealthy and own land. In 1902, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, the first woman in Australia to lead the women suffrage rights fight, her dream came true. Women were finally allowed to vote, now just one fight for the Aboriginals and Torres Strait Islanders then everything will be fair. From 1902 to 1965 every state finally changed their laws to allow Aboriginals and Torres Strait Islanders. After we finished learning about how people in Australia gained the right to vote, we made our way into an interactive game room. We all had so much fun in that room, but had even more fun when we had a taste at voting!

#### Questacon: Samuel

Questacon was one of the best experiences of the trip to Canberra. It held lots of exciting hands on science experiments and little exhibition topics of all sorts of things! We first started off walking up a pathway that lead all the way to our first room, the Lego room. There were a lot of activities that involved mostly building with Lego. There was one where you had to build a station for astronuats to stay in on Mars, and one where you had to build a strong bridge too! We walked into our next room called Fundamental! It had some random illusions that made us wonder, how does this work? On the walls or on the tables of the exhibits would be writing explaining how the science worked. The next rooms were a breeze with Awesome Earth and Under the Moon. Awesome Earth had a big countdown for a huge lightning strike! Under the Moon had us sit under a gargantuan replica of the moon held floating above us by iron chains! There was a room with a concerningly high slide that had you hold onto a bar and

then let go to fall down! Scary and exciting. The last room was the Q Lab. Lots of random science about nature and the human body. After that we had to leave for our motel, sad but excited for tomorrow.

#### Parliament House: Brodie B

Day 2 of our Canberra excursion. First we went to Parliament House (the new one). It looked very nice but we weren't allowed in because someone graffitied on the War Memorial so the Federal Police thought maybe they should check Parliament

House, so we weren't allowed in. Then we had to stay outside in the freezing cold. We got to play some bullrush on the front lawn of Parliament House. After that a man came over and we played some fun games based on Parliament. Then we did geometry. We stood on an axis that led to the War Memorial, and if you open all the doors from the prime minister's office you will see the War Memorial.


#### Australian Institute of Sport: Archie W

Before Canberra got its name, they were considering other names such as Cookaburra, Wheatwoolgold, Kangaremu, Caucus City and many more. At the end, we worked in groups to design our own capital city using lego.














# New Arrivals Program

# For our K-2 students:

Students in K-2 have been sharing lots of Premier's Reading Challenge books in library lessons and with their class teachers and are reaching their goal of reading 30 books. Please remember K-2 students will have their reading lists entered online by Mrs Smith.

#### For our 3-6 students:

Students in Years 3-6 who have been busy reading independently and entering their books online. We have been spending time on the reading challenge in library lessons and have had lots of practise accessing the PRC student site and updating their reading lists. To complete the challenge students in Years 3-6 are required to read **20 books**.

Students can choose to read:

- A minimum of 10 from the **PRC** list and a maximum of 10 **personal choice** books.
- Students may read up to 5 books from a PRC approved **series** as part of their reading list too!

Saver Plus is a free matched savings program to assist families living on a lower income to receive \$500 for educational expenses. We also provide budgeting workshops with the aim to improve long term financial wellbeing.



Participants can double their savings. If a participant reaches their savings goal each month for 10 months, ANZ will match it up to \$500.

(including uniforms, books, laptops, music lessons, sport, swimming lessons and excursions).


#### To be eligible for Saver Plus –

- Have a child in school (can be starting school next year) OR be studying yourself.
- Have regular income from work (either yourself or your partner)\* or receive child support payments.
- Be 18+ years old.

\* Many types of income and Centrelink payments are eligible

#### Participants take part in MoneyMinded workshops to develop (and keep) good savings habits.

Saver Plus fosters a sense of dignity and self-respect that extends beyond money matters.
